They will discover how the industrial revolution led to an increase in desire for coal and how this propelled the growth of the area.</p> <p>Comparing Impact of Growth in Middlesbrough Activity</p> <p>Children will complete a table, writing down how three key factors influenced the growth of Middlesbrough. They will then decide which they think was the most influential, using the table to support their thinking.</p> <p>Train departs for Port Darlington! Newspaper Article Activity</p> <p>Children will need to use the supplied information sheet to plan and write their own newspaper article about the day the first train departed for Port Darlington from Stockton. 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How did a discovery in the Cleveland Hills impact Middlesbrough?

Geology of North Yorkshire Activity
 This engaging activity will ask children to locate the important Cleveland Ironstone seam from a 19th century geological map. They will then transfer it to a modern map, so they can see where it was in relation to places that they know.

Middlesbrough Population Growth Activity
 This population growth activity will take a statistical look at how Middlesbrough grew as a result of the iron industry.

Extended Task: Can you write a biography for Henry Bolckow? He became Middlesbrough's first mayor in 1853 and paid for the construction of a school and park that can still be seen in the town today.

History of Middlesbrough Train Station Information PowerPoint
 In this PowerPoint, children will learn about the history of the train station in Middlesbrough. They will discover how the boom in industry increased population in the area and how this, in return, made it a requirement for a larger, improved train station.

Comparing History – Photo Pack
 This pack contains 4 historical photos of Middlesbrough's train station and dock area, alongside four modern photos. They will discuss and compare the differences between the photos, helping to bring history to life.

Architect Wanted! Job Advert Activity
 Children will put themselves in the shoes of the Mayor of Middlesbrough during the early 1870s. They will need to write a job advert looking for a new architect to build a train station in the town. They will apply what they have learned about the growth of the city and mention why this is an important and necessary job.

 This presentation will give children an idea of Middlesbrough's influence on the wider world through the iron produced there. It will give children a sense of pride in their home town.

Made in Middlesbrough Map Activity
 Children will use their geography and research skills to map out eight selected locations from around the world that contain a structure made using steel from the Middlesbrough area.

Made in Middlesbrough Fact File Activity
 Children will produce mini fact files on the eight locations that they mapped during the previous activity. A blank fact file is included if you wanted to investigate other structures as a class and use the results to create an engaging display.

Extended Task: Which moment in Middlesbrough's history is the most defining?



