We use resilience to mean the ability to adapt to changing circumstances, with regard to flooding and coastal erosion this is the ability to adapt to changing flood risks and to recover from flooding events. We would use it with regard to buildings - for instance know that many traditional building materials are more resilient to flooding than modern counterparts in that they can experience flooding, recover quickly and not need replacement (e.g. stone, brick, lime mortars and plasters solid wood). We also recognise that the historic environment can support resilience of people and communities.

If resilience is the ability to recover after flooding then overall resilience is about people, places and structures. Supporting resilience is about supporting those behaviours, activities and material considerations that facilitate adaptation to changing circumstances and recovery from flood events. That includes measures to avoid or reduce flooding in the first instance but that is not the only consideration. With regard to heritage assets good maintenance is important for resilience.
